#### Atlantic Crossings, Visionary Schemes, and Postnational Contexts: Charles Brockden Brown and his Contemporaries

With the recent flourishing of late eighteenth-century scholarship, a range of new approaches has begun to highlight the North Atlantic cultural and intellectual contexts of the 1790s. These readings often challenge the way texts have been situated within national discourses and instead examine how cultural matters exist in the interstices between regions. Others, informed by debates about postcolonialism and globalization, see the production and reception of all cultural artifacts as contingent on the appropriation, exchange, negotiation, and alliances of and between different ethno-status groups in their act of mutual encounter.

In important ways, Charles Brockden Brown stands as a vital touchstone for the traffic of cultures across and around the Atlantic, recording and responding to ideas, images, and news as they came to attention from sources in North America, Anglophone and continental Europe, and regions of the world colonized by European countries. This conference seeks to re-assess Brown as an intellectual within the larger cultural milieu in which he wrote, recognizing him as a versatile encyclopedist who was widely read in English, German, and French, and who engaged in some of the major controversies that moved intellectuals on different sides of the Atlantic.
